PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It gives me considerable pleasure to report to you on our activities for 1994. In reflecting on our workload, it is a source of pride and satisfaction to see how far we have come this year.

We began 1994 in damage control to our membership because of certain aspects of the implementation of our Technical Official Courses. Our AGM in Adelaide in March; our Swimmer's Forum at the National Swim; and more importantly, our new Director of Technical Development Pauline Samson and her Technical Committee, went a long way to resolve all outstanding issues. We now have a highly credible set of Officials Courses structured entirely for Masters swimmers and Masters events, and a steadily growing band of qualified Masters officials. Well done everyone.

Our Task Force restructure was left to lie on the table at our March AGM whilst Branches ascertained if the rearranged and additional Board portfolios were what was required to take our Association successfully into the future. The remaining Task Force restructure recommendations met with divided support at the September Board meeting, so were shelved for the time being.

The South Australian Branch conducted a most enjoyable 19th National Swim and Club Championships in March. Whilst small in entries, (420) and with less than our usual 50% Branch participation, everyone who attended appreciated the friendly hospitality and efficient organisation of Peter Gillett and his committee.

There has been an undoubted declining trend in the number of participants to our National Swim since our peak 844 in

Perth in 1987. There are many and varied reasons for this and your Board is attempting to address the problem. An Easter date has been selected for the next two National Swims to alleviate the need for swimmers to take annual holidays from work to participate. Other issues include the plethora of events on the annual swimming calendar; the cost of participation and the publicity; and the medal question.

Whilst we attempt to keep costs down, we compete directly with the Masters Games circuit who receive significant Government grants, sponsorship, and charge between \$75 & \$95 per entry and are therefore able to provide better quality medals, marketing etc. If we raise our fees, we exclude a significant portion of our membership. I urge our members to support our National Swim, it is our event, our Championships.

The Masters Games - Australian, Regional and World, had has an undoubted effect on AUSSI. Whilst the proponents of these suggest that they provide a way to increase our membership, this is in fact not the case.

It has become obvious that some of our former members have opted out belonging to AUSSI and paying their yearly subscription and instead participate only in Masters Games. We need to take a close look at ourselves over this, but it does cause us some other concerns. Masters Games do not require any club membership as a pre requisite, indeed they encourage people to compete "off the street", where AUSSI requires people to be registered and to have gained at least a basic level of fitness before participating in our competition. We also have fairly stringent safety policies for our membership.

Masters Games, because of their multi sport nature, create problems with central administration trying to get all sports to conform to one pattern or rules, which may or may not be against the rules of that particular sport. There is also the problem of clash of dates.

These problems were highlighted this year for AUSSI as Mary Sweeney and her Queensland Branch worked for 2 years to conduct the swimming section of the World Masters Games in Brisbane in Sept/Oct. Of the \$94 entry fee, the sports were given \$15 per entry fee to fund their event. Of this they had to provide a function to the value of \$7.50 leaving them only \$7.50 to fund or seek sponsorship to provide venue hire, results, uniforms etc. One can image the cost of running a Meet for nearly 2,000 competitors for a 5 day period. Additional sponsorship and in kind sponsorship was difficult to source as the Games management imposed all manner of restrictions over this. However the major problem to be overcome was the central registration procedures and the late receipt of entries well past the closing date.

Whilst no one could envisage that the entries received by the central Games office would jump in the final days from 12,000 to 24,000; and one can understand that this could generate a severe backlog for both the Games office and the sport, one must ask, did the sports get fair recompense for the workload involved? The answer for sports who do not own their own facilities is a resounding NO. Our Queensland Branch will be lucky if they come out with a surplus after many backbreaking months of work. What concerns me greatly as President is the fear that we have 'burnt out' many of our very valued and experienced Masters officials and organisers. The loss will be to our organisation, whilst the World Masters Games will move happily on to Oregon USA, and the Australian Masters Games will move to seek the support of our Victorian Branch for 1995.

Masters Games are not all negative and the issues I have raised here are not insurmountable problems. However they must be addressed and we must be aware of them. On behalf of you all I extend our heartfelt thanks to Mary Sweeney and her committee for a job well done, and one praised widely internationally.

1994 was also the year of the FINA & MSI Masters Congresses and the FINA World Masters Swimming Championships held in Montreal in July. Our Executive Director and I attended the FINA & MSI meetings on behalf of Australia and in excess of 100 Australians joined the nearly 4000 competitors at the Montreal Pool. Full, detailed reports were circulated to Branches. The next FINA Congress and World Masters Swimming Championships will be held in Sheffield, England in 1996.

International concerns occupied a great

part of the final months of 1994 with the problems arising from the MSI hosted swim in Hawaii scheduled for 1995. It was gratifying to see the high esteem AUSSI is held in by other countries as Japan, US, Germany and Canada sought our opinions and advice on this matter. Because US Masters Swimming is the only body to have two classification of a 'sanction' this led to a misunderstanding with FINA and to the unfortunate cancellation of the Meet. The mandate of FINA, MSI and all member Masters countries is to promote Masters swimming, so it is a shame that such a Masters event, planned for and by Masters swimmers should have had to be cancelled. Prepaid deposits I understand are to be refunded.

AUSSI also has been involved with FINA and ASI on the preparation of a bid to host the VII FINA World Masters Swimming Championships in Perth in January or February 1998 immediately following the FINA World Elite Championships.

Since our Board directive in September, I have been working to secure Federal and State Government support for this event. In preparing the \$1.1 million budget I was fully aware of the need to provide maximum support for our volunteers and officials if we were to ask them to host such a large and prestigious event. We would not tolerate a repeat of past and recent burn out experiences. The bid was prepared by myself and Eventscorp W.A. with the endorsement of ASI and the W.A. Government and was received by FINA in Switzerland on December 27th. We now have to wait the outcome.

In conclusion I would like to thank all our Branches for their hard work and support. I have already singled out the S.A. and Queensland Branches, and I would like

to also congratulate the Victorian Branch for the professional way they have pursued their administrative future. Special thanks too, to my Management Committee for their support and excellent contribution during 1994. To David Forsythe, our Director of Finance for his attention to detail, integrity and valued opinions; to Kay Cox for her incredible capacity for work, and for presenting AUSSI with a Level II Coach Accreditation Course which was used by the Australian Coaching Council as a model for all sports to follow; to Ivan Wingate for being an invaluable Executive Director and friend.

I am sure our membership will realise from the reports to follow, that in 1994 our Board worked hard to ensure Australian Masters swimmers continued to have the opportunity to swim on in safety.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

I was out of the Office for thirty seven working days this year, plus I was twelve weekends away from home on AUSSI business, which indicates the amount of 'mingling' I was able to do with AUSSIs all over Australia and whilst overseas. I feel that it is a very important aspect of the Executive Director's role but is at a cost: I am still catching up on my backlog of administration work and of course we spent a lot of dollars. Only two of my six interstate/overseas visits however, came out of National AUSSI funds and one was in connection with a Board Meeting anyway. My mixing with Members with little or no usual connection with the National scene has a two way benefit in

that it gives me a far better understanding of what our Members want and they get to see that "Them" are not mythological after all - in fact some are surprised to see that you can swim. I trust that I have been able to convey my understanding of the variation in cultures within our Branches to the Board Members, so that our decisions around the cold, hard, mahogany board room table are balanced to suit the majority of our Members needs.

THE NATIONAL OFFICE

Being out of the Office so much, didn't mean that the shop was shut. I thank Sue Harris for her support throughout the year, especially during the times I was away. Sue, through her activities with AUSTSWIM at the Aquatic Centre, was able to at least 'pop in' to the Office every day even when there wasn't pressing matters to attend to. Of interest, because Sue would usually start early and I often work on, the Office was often attended from 7.30 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. each day. Please don't expect that to become a standard.

We again thank the Adelaide Aquatic Centre for its support of AUSSI in the provision of gratis office space. For several years we have endured a very noisy, hot and humid facility overlooking the main pool. It was the old recording room before the Centre was enclosed. With the long-time-coming promise of Government money for new office space becoming imminent and with a shuffle of Centre staff, the Assistant Manager's office became vacant and was kindly offered to AUSSI. It is airconditioned, quiet (most times) and as I can't now see the pool-deck, productivity has increased significantly. In return for the Centre's

hospitality, we do what we can to promote its image and encourage adult lap swimming (with Adelaide Masters if we can) and I took the opportunity recently to personally hand promotional videos to some of the high ranking FINA people whilst in Canada.

BOARD MEETINGS

The two Board meetings this year were in Adelaide in conjunction with the National Swim and in Brisbane in conjunction with the World Masters Games. I sincerely thank Sue Harris in Adelaide and Trish Beveridge in Brisbane for taking draft minutes on computer during the meetings. I seem to have a phobia about getting minutes out on time, so without their help, our valuable history might still be waiting to be properly recorded. We now have our own lap top computer for this purpose in the future.

I reported last year that the Board Meetings had been opened to ordinary Members by invitation on an experimental basis. Four visitors sat in on the Adelaide meeting and there were none in Brisbane. The experience in Adelaide would suggest that some adjustments need to

be made if we are to continue with the practice, but is certainly worth persevering with before any final decision on policy is made.

We had three new faces at the March meeting: Kay Cox, Beryl Stenhouse and Geoff Robinson. Then through the retirements by Judy Ford and Peter Gillett through the year, we welcomed Jean Harvey and Russell Clarke to the September meeting. Also because David Cummins was unable to get to Brisbane, Leonie Gaston joined us. We therefore had a 50% change from the meeting twelve months prior.

MANAGEMENT STRUCTURE

The Task Force appointed to review our *modus operandi*, addressed a number of issues and made a number of recommendations, some for significant change. The Board only adopted the recommendation to extend the portfolio system, but caused the Branches to have a very close look at the direction in which we are heading. The exercise therefore was very fruitful. The allocation of portfolios appears on page one of this Annual Report. Another area the Task Force addressed was to review the National Executive Director's contract. The new contract was adopted by the Board and then offered to me for a term of three years with conditions of renewal. I was very pleased to accept the offer and sincerely thank the Board Members for their confidence in me.

The Management Committee had many things to attend to throughout the year and held five meetings by Conferlink. It's pleasing to see the interest shown in the activities of the Management Committee by the agenda items being put forward and questions raised when the Minutes

come out. The interest and synergy created from it I feel is the strength of our Organisation today.

IN THE SWIM

My own swimming had a turn for the better this year, having gone in a National Swim, three Masters Games and a World Swim. After the National Swim in Adelaide, I had cause to attend a meeting just prior to the Tasmanian Masters Games, so was able to enter the swimming at Devonport. In July as one of your delegates to the FINA and MSI Congresses in Montreal, Canada, I found time to mix it with the best in the world, then in September I was able to medal at the World Masters Games in Brisbane. Two weeks later I was in Alice Springs as referee at the Honda Masters Games and found time for a few swims and a Triathlon.

FINA & MSI CONGRESSES

Glenys and I attended four meetings and congresses in Montreal plus numerous other 'corridor' discussions. These are reported in depth elsewhere and I would urge all interested AUSSIs to make time to read them. A number of changes were made to the rules for Masters Swimming and it is questionable that the changes were made by and for Masters Swimmers. The International Masters Swimming political scene is not in good shape at present and the cancellation of the Hawaii Masters Festival is a product of the distrust in existence.

TECHNICAL MANUALS

In Montreal, we were proud to present to the MSI Members, the progress we had made with our Coaching and Officials accreditation courses. We had with us the draft course manual for the Officials

and the redesigned Level 1M Coaching accreditation manual. Without doubt, we are the most advanced country in both these areas. It is pleasing to report that we now have very professionally presentable manuals for Coaching Levels 1M and 2M and for Technical Officials. The Officials Course development was made possible through a grant from the Australian Sports Commission and the Coaching advances with the advisory assistance of the Australian Coaching Council. However, neither would have happened without the extensive professional input from Pauline Samson and Kay Cox. All AUSSIs should feel proud for having such talent on their Board.

WORLD MASTERS GAMES

I was privileged and pleased to witness first hand, the talent of the Queensland team who put together and ran the swim meet for the World Masters Games. There is much I would like to say and at the risk of singling out one of many who did so much to make the event so successful, I would like to say congratulations to Mary Sweeney for her leadership and control of the situation which put AUSSI in good light to such a large audience.

Undoubtedly, the Games were a huge success and the swim meet was too. With 1843 swimmers entered it wasn't our biggest, but the 1561 Australians is the most we have had at a swim meet. A matter that AUSSI needs to address very closely is that 45% of the Australians entered, were non-AUSSIs and 137 of these were former registered Members. Our people gave countless voluntary hours, much of it with a high level of expertise and with lots of valuable experience and AUSSI know-how developed over nearly two decades,

which went to benefit 979 non-AUSSI swimmers. The financial return to AUSSI however, is pitiful especially when you consider the drain on personnel resources (burnout) that has resulted from the Event. Another credit to the members of the organising committee, is that they have put together a 145 page comprehensive report of their experiences and have made many constructive recommendations for the conduct of future similar events - some of these need to be addressed by the Board. Every AUSSI Branch now has a copy, so Agenda items should be put forward accordingly. Should AUSSI be successful with its bid for the 1998 World Masters Swim to be held in Perth, the Report will become invaluable.

In summary, it was a big year for AUSSI. I sincerely thank the many who have helped me through the year; Glenys, Kay and David, all Board Members and a number of Branch Secretaries and Presidents. The current interest in spreading the workload augers well for AUSSI's future.

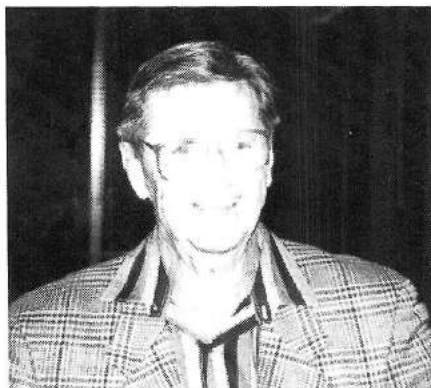

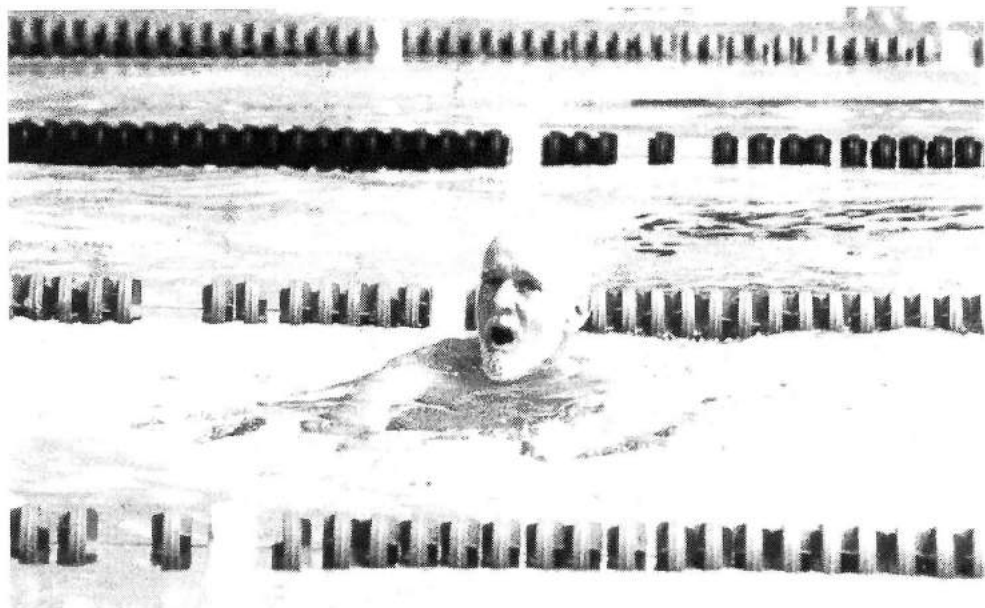

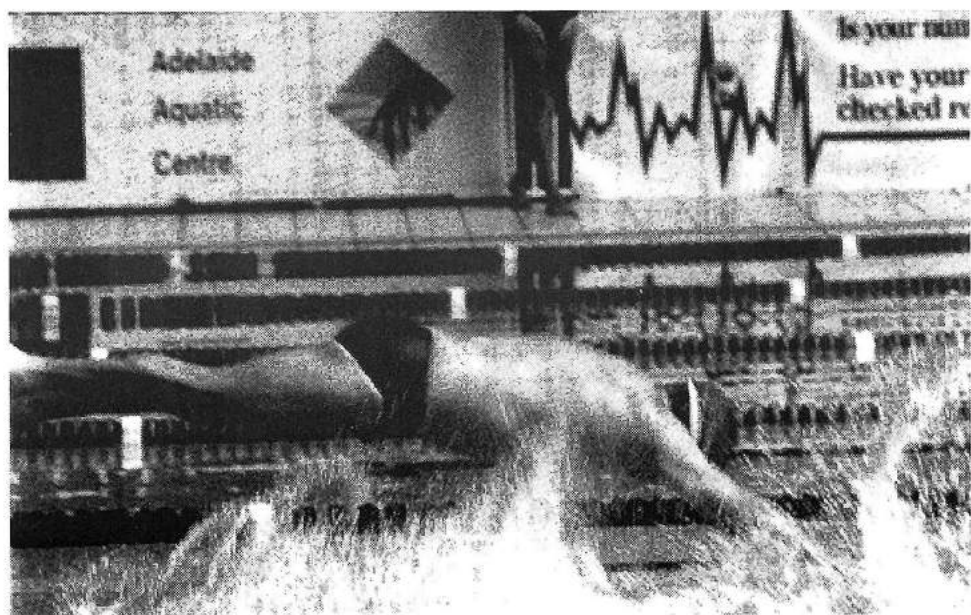

AUDIT REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE AUSSI MASTERS SWIMMING IN AUSTRALIA INCORPORATION

We have audited the attached Financial Statements in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. It was not practicable for us to establish control over memberships and sales prior to their initial entry in the accounting records, nor was it practicable for us to circularise members to confirm that all subscriptions have been received and recorded. Our audit relating to these transactions was therefore limited to the amounts recorded in the books of account.

Subject to the above, in our opinion the financial statements present fairly the financial position of the AUSSI Masters Swimming in Australia Incorporated at 31st December, 1994 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, and are in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 (As Amended).

COACHING

The 'Year of the Coach' has been a busy one for AUSSI on a National level particularly in the area of Coaching Accreditation. Even though our coaching courses have been established for some years they are in constant need of review and updating as part of our commitment to the Australian Coaching Council to participate in quadrennial reviews. These reviews are designed to maintain the quality of our coaching programmes. This places enormous demands of time and expertise on the person holding this position. So much so, that I believe AUSSI should be working towards either a part-time or full-time Coaching Director as is the case in many other sports. When I took on this portfolio the previous director of coaching, Anita Killmier retained the roles of newsletter editor and resources manager. The following is a brief outline of National Coaching activities in 1994.

COACHING ACCREDITATION

The latest figures from the Australian Coaching Council (ACC), indicate that

since 1985 AUSSI has trained 153 Level 1M coaches, 84 of those being female and 69 males. The first group of 7 Level 2M coaches from the Pilot course conducted in W.A. were granted accreditation in November 1994.

The Level 1M Coaching course administration documentation has been reviewed and updated in line with recommendations from previous National Coaching Panel meetings. The main

change from the original course is a 'take home' exam. A bank of suggested questions for this paper has been drawn up and is available to Branches. Details of the procedure to run a coaching course are available on request however, copies will be distributed to all Branches in 1995.

The main challenge this year was the documentation of the level 2M course for submission and approval to the ACC. The course followed the new guidelines set by the ACC and was formally approved on November 8th. This documentation will be distributed to all Branches in the form of a manual in 1995. Branches are able to apply to conduct this course from now on. The 7 W.A. coaches who completed the pilot course have now been accredited.

After meeting with Dr Ralph Richards the National Coaching Director of Australian Swimming, we are now able to submit our coaching accreditation applications directly to the ACC. This has speeded up the process to only take a few weeks instead of several months.

Much more work is needed to review the content of these courses and to train the coordinators of courses in each Branch. The most effective way to do this is to conduct a workshop for all Branch Directors of Coaching and/or course coordinators. Planning is underway to hold such a workshop in 1995. The standard expected by the Australian Coaching Council of coaching courses and their presentation has increased significantly over the past few years and we are expected to meet these standards.

Three Branches have conducted Level 1M courses this year. New South Wales, Tasmania and Queensland. Congratulations to these Branches and the Course Co-ordinators.

A second level 2M course was conducted in W.A. and attracted 8 participants. It is expected that level 2M courses will only be offered every alternate year if demand warrants it. A minimum of 8 participants are required to hold a course, hence coaching directors are encouraged to plan these in advance.

RE-ACCREDITATION

We have a re-accreditation policy that requires all coaches to update their qualification every 4 years. The first groups of coaches are due to submit their updating applications in January 1995. Branch Coaching Directors have been reminded of this and sent the relevant information. Our updating policy is also due to be reviewed and some materials rewritten. The most opportune time will be after the first groups have put the systems to the test. I look forward to getting feedback from the Branches on this matter.

LIAISON WITH AUSTRALIAN SWIMMING

I have had several conversations with Dr Ralph Richards the new National Coaching Director for Australian Swimming (ASI) with regards to our courses, their administration and how these fit in with the courses conducted by ASI. I met with Dr Richards on 23rd September to discuss coaching courses and other related areas. It was decided that we will forward our application for accreditation and re-accreditation to the ACC directly instead of the previous arrangement where all administration was forwarded through ASI. We identified the common areas of both organizations' coaching courses and discussed the ways in which we could give recognition to coaches working with both groups and

credit for courses done. This will be followed up in 1995.

COACHING PANEL

I was pleased to welcome three coaches, well known in their own Branches for their swimming knowledge and Masters Swimming expertise, to a re-established National Coaching Panel. Anita Killmier (VIC), Trish Beveridge (TAS), Peter Reaburn (QLD) and myself make up this panel. This subcommittee deals with coaching issues of National concern, in particular, the review of content and conditions of the coaching courses. The advantage of a Panel such as this is that it ensures input from people with varied backgrounds and expertise. It also helps with the decision making and provides support for the work that continually needs to be done in the coaching area.

COACH OF THE YEAR

Once again we conducted the 'Coach of the Year Award'. This award honours a coach of exceptional standing in AUSSI in any one year. This year there were 3 nominations, all worthy of winning, however only one award is granted. That was to Ed Peters from W.A. Ed was presented with the award in June and was delighted. Sadly, Ed passed away in November after a relapse in his health and a courageous battle with cancer. His coaching efforts and enthusiasm will be missed by his club and the W.A. Branch. Branches should continue to nominate coaches and even if they don't win one year it doesn't mean they won't win in another.

YEAR OF THE COACH

As we all know 1994 was the 'Year of the Coach'. Some Branches have put on special events to acknowledge or promote coaching. For example a dedication

dinner, a breakfast and seminars were some of the activities I know of. I requested that Branches nominate coaches for recognition awards and forwarded the information to all Branches. I also nominated several coaches who I knew of that had made a valuable contribution to AUSSI coaching and I hope that all those that deserved recognition received it.

PLANNING

A 5 year Coaching plan is starting to take shape and Branches will be asked for suggestions in 1995. As stated previously it is essential that we start to get Branch Coaching Directors together in a workshop situation on a regular basis. The first of these will be in 1995.

NEWSLETTER AND RESOURCES

As mentioned earlier the Resource Centre is with Anita Killmier and Branches and clubs are encouraged to use this. Thanks are in order to Anita for the production of Coaching Newsletter. This I know takes a lot of time and effort and deserves support from all members as it contains information and assistance for all AUSSI swimmers. Subscriptions are growing however, increased support is always welcome.

CONCLUSION

I would like to conclude by thanking all those Branch Coaching Directors and Course Coordinators who I have worked with this year and I hope to meet all of you next year and look forward to working together to deliver quality coaching to our members. My thanks to Anita for helping me to settle into the job, the Coaching panel for their contribution, the Management Committee for their support and to Ivan for all his administrative assistance.

NATIONAL SWIM MEET POLICY

There has not been much in the way of activity in this new portfolio due mainly to my failure to encourage assistance from other members wanting to get involved and my inactivity over the year to date to invite responses from Branches as to their current position in regards to the areas of policy covered by the Portfolio, being subjected to family distractions and work commitments.

Resulting from the Task Force review and the establishment of two new portfolios the areas of responsibility for the Director of Swim Meet Policy has been outlined as follows:

- Liaise with host Branch of future National Swims.
- Review National Swim Meet Programme as required.
- Update National Swim Meet Guide as necessary.
- Review Swim Meet medical procedures.
- Produce and update an AUSSI Safety Policy.
- Suggest personnel for a Medical sub-committee and report for them.

NATIONAL SAFETY POLICY

Draft policy as produced by the Committee chaired by Dr Russel Spinks was ratified by the AGM for adoption by Branches.

Branches invited to advise current actions in adopting the draft policy, together with

nominated Branch Safety representative's contact details. Where adoption not yet implemented advise of a timetable for appointment of a safety officer and implementation.

Branches invited to notify suggested improvements to draft policy for consideration and recommendation for adoption by Management Committee.

Branches to give consideration to their appointed Safety officer being a member of the National Safety Committee with the Chairman being appointed from these representatives.

The Safety Committee should be a permanently appointed National Committee reporting to the Board through the Director of Swim Meet Policy.

Committee should not be charged with the responsibility for re-inventing the wheel or producing a too detailed or rigid policy.

The development of a manual outlining the policy requirements and how to go about implementing and/or to handle specific issues and incidents is seen to be more appropriate. The manual could make reference to existing policies/procedures in use by like organisations

such as FINA/MSI/ASI or the Australian Sports Medicine Federation and the like.

SWIM MEET POLICY (incl. National Swim Meet Guide)

Branches are being asked to consider whether it is appropriate that a formal policy be established for the conduct of all levels of swim meets i.e. Club championships, InterClub swims, Branch championships and the National Swim and Club championships, in addition to the AUSSI Rules and for this policy to be set out in a manual form such as the National Swim Guide.

In addition they are being asked as to what they see as the minimum content of such a manual of policy and procedures.

Again it must be seen that any such document would be for guidance only and not necessarily hard and fast rules otherwise there would be conflict between the manual and the AUSSI Rules.

The coverage of such a document would need to be over the full range of swims undertaken/organised by members, such as open water swims, postal swims, Top Ten long swims etc, and may incorporate the Aerobic Swims manual.

Branches are being asked if they already have a form of Swim Meet policy or procedures document and if not, whether there is an intention to develop one, and if there is whether one could be made available for assistance in developing a National Policy/procedures manual.

Other areas of the portfolio objectives have yet to be addressed. Hopefully the future will provide time and resources to cover all the objectives.

NATIONAL RECORDING

I must commend Peter Gillett for his well kept and easily accessed set of record documents. The way in which they were cared for shows the dedication and love for this task that Peter had, there is no doubt all AUSSI members are forever indebted to his efforts.

Computerisation of the recording functions was my first priority to facilitate distribution of a hard copy of the current records. This has been achieved as well as distribution by floppy disk, Branch recorders can now view them on the computer screen or produce hard copies as well as receiving more updates.

The software for the Branch and national Top Ten competitions has been extensively modified with the major changes being the addition of relay team member's names and ages. The Branch software now allows for 25m individual and 4 x 25m relay events. The changes required for the new age rules were easily incorporated. It was disappointing that not all of the Branches used the Top Ten or compatible software this year. No doubt this led to one of the very late submissions.

MARKETING

This is a new portfolio within the Board and there seems four ways to tackle this area.

1. Marketing by way of promotions and merchandising.
2. Marketing of AUSSI to it's members.
3. Marketing of AUSSI to the community.
4. Marketing of AUSSI in order to obtain sponsorship.

1. MERCHANDISING

With the Merchandising Contract to a private person being terminated, there is an opportunity for National AUSSI to fill the gap under the umbrella of marketing. A recent survey to the Branches indicated the following: Victoria enthusiastically supported the concept of equal profit sharing. Western Australia, South Australia, Queensland and Tasmania are in agreement of marketing on a limited scale. New South Wales, ACT and Northern Territory had no opinion as they forwarded no reply from the survey.

In the past sales AUSSI products returned no profit to the branches who did the promotional work. The first time this impasse was broken was the mutual profit sharing arrangement with the sale of the Mastering Swimming Book.

Queensland Branch seized this opportunity and up to October 1994 had sold 180 copies before the World Master Games and another 70 copies during the Games. Any National merchandising in future should be on an equal profit sharing arrangement between the branches and the National Office.

In the near future each branch will receive stocks of brightly coloured caps in colours of red, gold and bottle green and cotton slouch hats in white. If each branch enthusiastically promotes these products, the returns will more than compensate for their efforts.

2. MARKETING OF AUSSI TO ITS MEMBERS

The national Newsletter is the most effective way of spreading the word to the members. We need to encourage the club secretaries to pass on the National Newsletter to all club executives ending up in the hands of the club publicity officers who can reproduce items of interest in to their own club newsletter. A copy of the National newsletter should be sent to all members of the branch executives the rationale being that members of the various branch committees are often not members of a club executive and usually do not see the only copy that is sent to the club. The AUSSI coaching newsletter which is published every three months, as an area of greater awareness and exposure, could make this valuable publication viable.

3. MARKETING OF AUSSI TO THE COMMUNITY

This is probably best undertaken on a Branch by Branch basis as each Branch seems to have different priorities and different circumstances. Suggestions are always welcome.

4. MARKETING OF AUSSI TO THE COMMUNITY TO OBTAIN SPONSORSHIP

Sponsorship must be addressed by the fully equipped National Office with its full time staff, not by volunteers with limited time and resources. The National Executive need to energetically and positively approach the Australian Sports Commission with yearly programmes for funding. A positive approach to private enterprises which have Australia wide connections needs attention.

TECHNICAL DEVELOPMENT

This last year has seen many developments in this portfolio. After the Board Meeting in March, a workshop was held in Adelaide with representatives from most Branches. The accreditation scheme was totally revamped and to enable ease of administration Branches were to appoint their own Technical Officer to conduct courses. The task of the workshop was to set out requirements and guidelines for the administration of

all technical official positions. This was a most productive weekend and the results were formulated and presented to the Board Meeting in September.

Each Branch has a 'manual' which contains a section for each of the positions of Timekeeper, Marshal, Check Starter, Starter, Referee which includes information as to requirements, guidelines for administration, lecture notes/rules and a log sheet. Additional information is included for the Announcer and Recorder. This manual was to replace the 'Guidelines for Referees' which gave a complete overview of all positions revolving around the rules of AUSSI. This document was rather daunting for those people who were only interested in one position therefore with the new approach, new officials need only concern themselves with the relevant section. It was also decided that non-AUSSI people were most welcome to complete accreditation under the new scheme.

The National Technical Committee was appointed in April and has representatives from 4 Branches. Our organisation is large enough to be able to conduct swim meets run by our own officials which is to

the advantage of our members. It is therefore the responsibility of the Branch to conduct courses when the need arises. The new Technical Accreditation scheme began in ACT in July and courses have been conducted in WA, TAS, VIC and NSW. There have been a number of equivalent accreditations granted and to date AUSSI has 13 Referees.

It is pleasing that so many people are keen to participate in the courses offered and complete hours on deck. Being involved in the technical side allows the swimmer greater participation and a better understanding of the administration and rules of a swim meet. The courses have gained recognition here and overseas as being both innovative and professional.

During 1994, there was an increase of 5.9% in the membership of AUSSI Masters Swimming, with membership passing 7000 for the first time and reaching 7336. NEW MEMBER KITS

The previous Director, Bren Catchpole, issued to branches for distribution pre-assembled New Member Kits. Their printing and assembly is now the responsibility of the Branches although AUSSI National pays for them.

It is now two years since these were first distributed, so a review of the contents is now needed. I have therefore designed an Evaluation Form listing the contents of the kit with spaces to evaluate their effectiveness on a scale of 1 to 5. This has been distributed to all clubs in the NSW Branch for feedback and I propose to then revise it and send it to all Branch Secretaries. They will be asked for their opinions as well as being asked to get some from clubs. Any changes to the Kit will then be written.

Branches will also be asked how they manage the distribution of these kits so that recommendations can be made.

CLUB GUIDE

I have received some suggestions from other Branches for updating the Club Guide and the task of revising it is now under way. It should be produced in a loose-leaf format so that it can be updated regularly and also have a specific section for each Branch.

CLUB SECRETARY AND VENUE LISTS

In response to my request, Branch Secretaries have sent to all other Branches a copy of their Club Secretary and Venue list. This is especially useful for answering enquiries by members moving or travelling interstate. Branches should update this to other Branches at least twice a year in future.

NEW CLUB DEVELOPMENT

While the assistance needed for the formation of a new club is best provided by its Branch, a New Club Kit should be provided by AUSSI National. I have obtained lists of what several Branches send to new clubs and will be making a recommendation to the Board for a National New Club Kit.

REMOTE CLUBS

The problem of how to encourage the formation of clubs in areas distant from larger cities needs to be addressed and I will be seeking ideas from Branches which have been successful in maintaining clubs in remote areas.

QUEENSLAND BRANCH

WORLD MASTERS GAMES

Undoubtedly for Queensland, the dominating event of 1994 was the World Masters Games held in September/October. For several years, and certainly for all of 1994, a great deal of time and manpower (and womanpower) was expended in promoting, organizing and hosting these Games. The WMG are now history, swimming was a great success both from a competition and an enjoyment point of view, and Queensland Masters Swimming is proud to be in part responsible for this success. The financial return however bore little relationship to the time and effort put into the organization of the Swim. These Games also raised many questions regarding Masters Games in general (fully stated in the Swim Committee's WMG Report) which I believe needs to be considered by the Board.

COACHING

Due to the lead up and training for the WMG the pilot Level 2M coaching course was put on hold. This Level 2M course is scheduled for February 1995. A Level 1M course was held in Toowoomba. Six coaching workshops, which always prove very popular were held throughout the Branch. Two massage workshops were held in Brisbane which also were popular. Our two Branch coaching Directors attended, and lectured at, the National Coaching Conference held on the South Coast in May and thus further fostered Masters Swimming coaching techniques.

TECHNICAL DEVELOPMENT

Results of technical exams have begun coming through from the National arena and to date 196 persons have received

accreditation - (94 Timekeepers, 41 Marshals, 35 Check Starters, 24 Starters and 2 referees). Most of these sat their exams during 1993 and more results are due for the exams sat in 1994.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership in 1994 reached an all time high with 1931 members. We know some new members joined to gain competition experience for the WMG, and whether these swimmers will join again remains to be seen. The number of clubs totalled 46, again an all time high. We were especially happy to welcome Duck Creek as part of the Queensland Branch this year. If grant funds permit, in 1995 we will be looking at the possibility of starting new Clubs in the Central West and the South West areas of the State.

COMMUNICATION

Distance will always remain our greatest challenge. It is however a challenge we recognize and have endeavoured to overcome in a variety of ways. Conferlink meetings continue to unite the Branch Committee. The Branch newsletter now reaches 100% of members with costs built into membership fees. Since 1989 Queensland Branch has doubled it's membership and just keeping pace with this growth has been a huge task. A decentralized Branch Committee also means that at least one member of the Committee is likely to be present at all Club Swim Meets.

SWIM MEETS

As stated, the major Swim Meet held in Queensland was the World Masters Games, but many Queensland members attended the Montreal Swim and came home with an amazing number of gold, silver and bronze medals. Fewer members than other years attended the

National Swim in Adelaide (again due to decisions to attend the WMG in Brisbane) but those who did thoroughly enjoyed themselves. Following Queensland's policy to rotate the State Titles between regions, in 1994 they were held in Rockhampton. The three Branch trophies (for top Club aggregate points, top average points and best of the rest points) gave all clubs a goal which was achievable regardless of numbers. Miami Club assisted in the organization of the Australian Long Distance Championships on the Gold Coast in March.

NATIONAL AEROBIC TROPHY

COMPUTING PROGRAMMES

The acquisition of the National Computing Programme has lessened the load for our Registrar, Recorder and Aerobics Officer. The recent acquisition of the WA

Swim Programme will still further reduce the work load for the Recorder.

NATIONAL PORTFOLIO

The Branch undertook the entirely new National Marketing Portfolio this year, thus presenting us with another challenge. Our Branch's National Delegate has been investigating ways of handling this Portfolio.

BRANCH COMMITTEE

Branch Committee members again worked extremely hard during the year to achieve set goals and to make Queensland Masters Swimming what it is today. Members attended many meetings organized by the Department of Sport and the Sports Federation of Queensland during the year. A number of these were solely (or partly) concerning the increased interest in Masters sports and funding of masters sports and we hope our contribution to these meetings proves to be worthwhile in the long term. We also continued our involvement in Austswim. We had planned to upgrade ASSA accreditation for at least some of the Branch Committee to Level 2 this year and to further accredit more of the Committee with Level 1 qualifications, but this was another area that was put on hold due to the Games.

I do not intend to stand again as President next year and I take this opportunity to thank all those who supported me over the last three years.

NSW BRANCH

1. MEMBERSHIP

The membership of this Branch, in the 1993-94 season, has reached an all time high of 1488, this total being 54 higher than last year's. In this total are 469 new members, which means that 1017 of last year's members re-registered and 417 did not. This is the first time we have retained over 1000 of the previous year's members.

New clubs are the major source of new members, so every effort is made to encourage their formation. During 1994, the new clubs formed were Coalfields (at Cessnock), Myall (at Tea Gardens), Singleton and Greenhills Gators (at Beresfield). Narooma and Tuggerah Lakes disbanded.

2. MAJOR CARNIVALS

We changed the name of our State Cup to State Championships and changed the order of events, as well as carrying out other changes suggested by the members in last year's survey. The meet was again held at Blacktown and attracted 512 entries, considerably more than in the previous year and confirming the upward trend in carnival participation. It will be interesting to see how many entries our 1995 Championships will attract at the new Sydney International Aquatic Centre.

The 1994 State Cup was won by Warringah Masters with 2311 points from North Sydney 1891 and Manly 1742.

The Short Course Championships were held at Singleton in the Hunter Valley for the third time and finally led to a club being formed at the Singleton Pool. The interclub pointscore at the Short Course was won by Warringah Masters with 1808

points from North Sydney 1467 and Ettalong 1245.

3. OTHER CARNIVALS

There were 21 Interclub Carnivals during the year, with two meets having been held in most months. The participation rate has continued to rise at carnivals in popular venues, with the biggest meet attracting 335. However, some clubs are still getting only about 100-150 entrants due to less attractive pools.

The Pelican Pointscore for interclub carnivals was won by the Ettalong in a countback from Cronulla Sutherland.

4. BRANCH RECORDS AND TOP TEN

Our Computer Recorder, Brett Larkin, has continued to upgrade the Computer Programme as required. The recording of names of members of relay teams has been well received. Harry Schofield has capably looked after the Records Recorder's job, with large numbers of certificates issued during the year.

5. SWIMATHON

In September 1994, we ran another swimathon to raise funds for the Cancer Council. A total of \$17,026.25 was raised by the 14 clubs who participated or sent donations.

6. ACCREDITATION OF COACHES AND OFFICIALS

A course for the accreditation of coaches (Level 1M) was held in May, the coordinator being Iain McDowell Jones. Over fifty people applied for places in this, with it being limited to 36 places, so another course is being planned in the near future by our coaching director, Di Coxon.

Following the excellent work done by the National Director of Technical Development, Pauline Sampson, accreditation courses were held by Sue Johnstone for timekeepers. Course for other officials are planned for 1995.

7. PROMOTION AND SPONSORSHIP

Our President, Roger Johnston, has continued to seek sponsorship during 1994. Peters Foods has sponsored a Tepee Tent for us to use a Beach Swims and outdoor carnivals - it was first used on the lawns at Singleton during our Short Course Championships. The NSW Government has again given us a grant of \$4,000, but this has not been raised for several years despite many representations.

8. NEWSLETTER

Three issues of this have been produced during 1994 by our new editor, "Charlie's Wife", whose identity is still a mystery to many of our members.

In closing, I would like to thank all members of the NSW Management committee for their support during 1994, and also Ivan Wingate.

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN BRANCH

Membership improved only by 15 to total 1367 for 1993/94 but we look forward to a solid growth with the attraction of the Be Active 20th AUSSI Masters National Swim being held in Perth in 1995. One club, Gosnells AUSSI (formerly Kenwick) moved to a new aquatic complex and achieved a wonderful revival amongst members and much support from the local Council. Another fast growing club was Mandurah (affiliated in January,) in an area currently undergoing a population explosion. Our other new club for 1994 was Fremantle, affiliated in February. Maida Vale AUSSI celebrated their 15th Anniversary.

Our two State Championship Swims both achieved more entries than last year and many new records were set or broken. Claremont AUSSI was outright winner of both the Championships. Albany AUSSI ranked 5th overall which was a great effort from a country club. The Handicap trophy introduced in 1991 for the Long Distance carnival was won by Somerset.

In her second year as President, Alison Hollingworth led the Executive by setting a fine example, keeping everyone on track during meetings and working hard at poolside during our Championships. Alison also made visits to Albany and Geraldton during the year, in her capacity as a Level 2 Coach.

Vice President, Fred Van Andel was instrumental in co-opting Belmont, Osborne Park and Inglewood clubs to run the swim component of the World Fire Fighter Games. This was a real vote of confidence in the ability of AUSSI to oversee a swim meet. Fred was our

representative on the Volunteer Involvement Program which encouraged committees at all levels to recognise the valuable efforts of volunteers. We were able to thank some of our coaches by sending them to a Sports Breakfast in November. Fred also made a number of visits to clubs in his role as Liaison Officer.

It was disappointing not to have a Publicity Officer on the Executive for most of the year, but thanks to Alison, Fred and Leonie "Different Strokes" went to press on the due date each quarter. Response from clubs with their news and photographs was encouraging and then we supplemented with swim articles.

State Secretary was kept busy refurbishing our lap counters for long distance swimming and they have become a real talking point around the pool.

Kay Cox had her Level 2 Coaching Course accredited by Aust Coaching Council in November. With the assistance of the Level 2 Coaches it was possible to run a Swim Seminar over 2 consecutive Saturdays and this was a very successful exercise. Approximately 50 people attended each day.

to Albany, Bunbury and Mandurah, as well as 16 visits to metropolitan clubs to assist when invited. Carol also coaches the newly formed Fremantle AUSSI which she established, and it is making steady progress.

Noelle James held a Captains' meeting to discuss the timetable for Interclubs and another meeting for Recorders' to give them instructions starting from filling out cards correctly to then entering details into the computer programs, etc. There has been a lot of interest from clubs wanting to use the computer programs and Richard Johnson (our National Computer Committee representative) was kept busy assisting club members to get the programs up and running on in their various home computers.

Keith Bower held a half day Timekeepers Course which was very well attended by 52 members. He also flew to Adelaide for discussions with other members of the National Technical Committee and feels very pleased with the results achieved so far by this group.

Kay and Keith attended a Course Design Workshop, Course Assessors Workshop and Course Presenters Workshop, during 1994, all run by the Ministry of Sport & Recreation.

Leonie Gaston was kept busy in the Administrator's role. A new printer, new computer and new software have been installed in the office, to be more compatible with programs used by members of the Executive or temporary staff, when holiday time comes around. Leonie had the opportunity to represent WA in the absence of David Cummins at the Board Meeting in Brisbane. This was a good opportunity to learn what meeting requirements would entail for the next session to be held in Perth in April.

WA National Delegate David Cummins had a change of portfolio from Planning to Programmes as from the AGM held in March, 1994. As the bulk of the Programmes portfolio work occurs at the end of the year, we have not fully experienced the impact of this task yet. We had volunteers put their names forward to help though and this is very much appreciated.

At the request of Clubs, Certificates are now going to be presented to anyone who breaks or sets a State Record at our Summer or Winter Championships.

Our Nationals Committee has been meeting every month during 1994. Lynne Malone (Meet Officials Controller) was sent to Adelaide during their National Swim to gauge what was involved, and she found this exercise most worthwhile. We all look forward to hosting the Be Active 20th AUSSI Masters National Swim in Perth, over Easter in 1995, and making new friends of our interstate visitors.

VICTORIAN BRANCH

It gives me much pleasure to present the Victorian report for 1994, a year which saw an increase of 8 new clubs and 111 (9%) New members, finishing the year with 1326 members. Financially, 1994 was also a good year as we finished with a substantial surplus.

1994 was a great year in terms of increased numbers of members, 9% is our best growth since 1991. More members, coupled with the introduction of 8 new clubs, demonstrates the growing interest and enthusiasm towards AUSSI Masters swimming in Victoria. Increased membership augurs well for the future of

Masters swimming. However, within the apparent membership growth there lies a challenge for both the branch and the clubs. Since 1990, we have been losing about 25-30% of our members yearly. About 25-30% of our members do not register from one year to the next. Over the same time frame total membership has doubled. If we could retain most of these people, our membership would be around the 2000 mark. This is one of the issues that our workshop, "AUSSI 2000" addressed on November 19.

On November 19, the Branch conducted a workshop at Monash University, a forum which considered where we are now, where we would like to be in the Year 2000 and developed strategies to achieve those goals. About 35 people attended and generated many useful ideas on issues, structure, communication, competitions and coping with growth. Many of the ideas can be implemented quickly whilst others have long term horizons.

During the year we ran two very successful meets, both short and long courses at the State Swim Centre. The roster for the conduct of future meets is being revised in order to equitably distribute the workload. In 1995 the long course will be run over one day only (instead of two, as in the past) at Doncaster. The short course will be run at the State Swim Centre.

The future of branch administration was widely debated during the year, and our final decision was to establish an AUSSI office, with a permanent part-time administrator working set office hours. This will be up and running in early 1995. As yet, no-one has been appointed to the new position, we are currently seeking applications and expect to fill the position by February.

The decision to employ a permanent part-time administrator reflects the branch's increasing need for an office. It is no longer viable for us to rely on people operating from home, because the rate at which AUSSI is growing necessitates a fixed base. Our new office will be a rented office in the same building as VIC SWIM, which is located on Toorak Road, Hartwell.

In the long term, it is expected that the administrator will perform all branch administrative tasks. During 1995, the registration of new members will be included in this role. I would expect that by this time next year, we will need to review our branch organisation to take account of changes in duties of some of our elected office bearers.

Our *Swimmer* took on a new look in 1995, with Tracey Linguey taking on the role of editor. Tracey is a professional journalist, and the high quality of the *Swimmer* - in terms of layout, content, style and variety-reflects this. Well done Tracey. We will continue to publish quarterly during 1995.

1995 will be a big year, as Victoria is hosting the Australian Masters Games in October. We have committed to running the swimming component of the games - October 6-8. The Swimming will be run over Friday, Saturday and Sunday to allow maximum local involvement. As well, it will allow interstate visitors to make a long weekend of it.

Overall, I believe that 1994 was a successful year for the Victorian Branch of AUSSI, and we are poised for a bright future. Year to year success depends on the contribution of many people - office bearers, delegates, club officials and members. Thank you to all those who

contributed to the success of 1994.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN BRANCH

The 1994 year was one of mixed fortunes - some very good achievements, but others were somewhat short of what they should and could have been.

The effectiveness at the Branch level was handicapped because the Executive positions of Secretary, Volunteer Coordinator, Social Convenor, Swim Meet Director and Public Relations Officer were all unfilled at various times.

The Clubs appeared to have run very well, and presumably in accordance with the desires of the individual Clubs. Unfortunately there was a lack of Members who were willing to hold Executive positions or otherwise project their interest into the next higher level, and this certainly prevented the Branch from achieving its full potential. A worthy exception to this was the National Championships.

The major effort and success of the year was the National Championships during March. A Committee under Peter Gillett's very accomplished guidance planned the meet, and the Branch is cognisant of the very good work that all of the Committee Members did, especially Peter and Kit Simons, the Meet Director. That the Championships were a great success is a tribute to what the South Australian Members can do when they put their energies and know-how to work.

The Branch ran a modest local competition programme. There were four Interclub meetings, the two day State

Cup and seven Open Water Swims. These competitions attracted a response comparable with that of previous years.

Our Technical Development programme was disappointing with the Clubs not continuing to show the enthusiasm that was evident prior to and during the Nationals. This was unfortunate, because there was a shortage of qualified officials, and the Branch was dependent on help from Amateur officials for its major meets.

The scarcity of winter training facilities was made very evident this year. The Adelaide Aquatic Centre was closed during May, and the Noarlunga Centre was closed for several months to effect major repairs. It was fortunate that an "old" 25 metre outdoor pool was enclosed and upgraded, and this added facility was of great value. This was through the initiative of the strong Henley and Grange Amateur Swimming Club, and an outcome was the creation of an additional AUSSI Club.

The honour of Life Membership of the South Australian Branch was granted to Kit Simons for his outstanding contribution to AUSSI.

The Branch had competitors in the World Masters Swim at Montreal and the World Masters Games at Brisbane, and they did very well.

There was a great performance by six Adelaide Masters Swimmers who successfully swam the English Channel as a team in the time of 12 hours 15 minutes during July. The one female and five male team was Suzette Petrick, Noel Heritage, Andrew Martin, Geoff Moffatt, Max Thompson, and Chris Ford, with two capable reserves in Lindsay Tennyson and Dieter Loeliger.

Three new Clubs, Henley and Grange, Eastern Districts and State Swim Masters,

were formed during the year. Mountain Pool did not affiliate, but it was the nucleus of Eastern Districts, and Blue Lake Masters was not active. The registration statistics for the years ending September 1993 and 1994 are -

A \$5,000 Sponsorship from Foundation SA was awarded for the promotion and development of Masters swimming in South Australia. This is the first occasion that such an award has been made by a State Government instrumentality.

During the year Peter Gillett, who was the Branch's long time National Board Member and National Recorder, retired from involvement in AUSSI affairs. Peter is the type of person the Branch and the National organisation can ill afford to lose, and an extra effort will be required to weather this loss. The role of Board Member, with the portfolio of Recorder, is now held by the Branch President, Russell Clarke, with the national recording being performed by the Branch Recorder, Darryl Hawkes.

The Branch was well satisfied with the information and assistance provided by the National Office. The changes that

were made following the Task Force report are considered to be beneficial to AUSSI generally.

It is well understood that as an adult organisation Members have commitments other than AUSSI, but a major thrust for 1995 will have to be the promotion of the goals of this very worthy organisation through improved involvement at the Branch level. The mutual dependency of the Club and Branch families is not always fostered.

TASMANIAN BRANCH

This is my second Annual report on the activities of masters swimming in Tasmania. From a personal point of view this has been a good year with a full committee and positive developments in all branch portfolios. The Secretary's position was filled, taking the pressure off the acting secretaries, as was the fitness and coaching position. Again, the co-operation and goodwill of the committee members and club delegates made sure that meetings were constructive and purposeful. More importantly, there was effective follow up and action on committee decisions.

The Branch held five committee meetings and its annual general meeting and some lively debates took place on such matters as the format of championship meets, points scoring and medals, AUSSI vs FINA rules resulting in satisfactory outcomes for all. The review of the Branch Constitution has been scheduled for 1995.

The broad activities of the branch were guided by the priorities set in the previous year's strategic plan - the Branch

conducted a Level 1M Coaching course, trained more officials, kept to the spending target in the annual budget and increased its revenue from meet surpluses and sponsorships. I believe the Branch has a clear idea of its directions and where it wishes to put its energy and resources. However, the plan is a rolling one which will be reviewed and extended in 1995.

Coaching has been identified as a key priority for the 1994-1996 triennium. A course was impeccably organised and the course was professional and relevant. Early reports suggest that all 10 participants are well on the way to full accreditation. This course coincided with a coaches testimonial dinner to recognise the efforts of club coaches as part of the Year of the Coach activities.

In addition to the summer, winter and relay championships, the Branch organised the swimming component of the Tasmanian Masters Games. A large number of individual Branch and national records, however these do not match the number of personal best times achieved as well. It seems obvious that the AUSSI spirit is alive and well and that club coaches must be doing some things right! Although for most competition is restricted to the home state, some swam in the National and World Masters Games, bringing home a share of the medals.

It is pleasing to note that clubs and coaches are aware of their responsibilities as regards safety. All Clubs have safety officers and follow safety guidelines at training sessions and swim meets.

We all know that AUSSI is about fitness and fun and that competitions and medals are only one aspect of this. The real service to AUSSI members is given by the Clubs. Club committees organise meets, arrange coaching and training,

send out newsletters, attend meetings and set up social activities. In this respect, the State is fortunate. Club reports at Branch meetings and club newsletters show that a lot of hard work and good organisation underpins masters swimming in Tasmania, I congratulate the Clubs and their committees for their efforts this past year.

In conclusion I wish to thank members of the Branch committee who have worked hard throughout the year and given me great support in their various roles. I would also like to thank club delegates who turn up so regularly at Branch meetings.

There were seven Branch Executive Meetings during 1994. Some of these were also attended by non-executive ACT AUSSI members whose contribution and interest in the Branch and National affairs is most appreciated. Two Special General Meetings were also held, which were both well attended.

2.5 Publicity

Branch promotional activities in the year included:

- contribution to the ACT Sports Calendar, produced 6 monthly by the ACT Office of Sport, Recreation and Racing for distribution to the public, sporting and tourist organisations.
- use of AUSSI National posters and flyers.
- entry in the TELECOM white and yellow pages.
- promotion during Senior's Week

2.6 Swim for Heart

The National Heart Foundation conducted its annual 'Swim for Heart' fund-raising event in August. AUSSI swimmers co-ordinated teams at Civic and Tuggeranong pools, with some others participating in corporate and social teams. Carmen Carlon from the Canberra AUSSI Masters Swimming Club was again the highest fund-raiser.

3. NATIONAL

The Branch was responsible for the Director of Communications portfolio until March. Judy has done a wonderful job of representing the Branch I wish to thank her. Judy attended the National AGM held in Adelaide in March. The Branch is now responsible for the Planning Portfolio with Jean Harvey as Delegate. She participated in the National midyear Board Meeting in Brisbane in September.

4. SWIM MEETS AND EVENTS

4.1 Open Water Swim

ACT AUSSI assisted Telopea ASC with the conduct of an open water swim in Lake Burley Griffin in February. The swim was conducted over distances from 1.5 km to 8 km, attracting swimmers from ACT and NSW.

4.2 ACT Long Distance Swim Meet

This event was held at the AIS pool on 23 and 24 July 1994. There were 110 swimmers entered; 28 from all 4 ACT clubs and 82 from NSW clubs. This year the meet was run as short course (we cannot hire the AIS pool for long enough on the Saturday to run long course). Application for the recognition of at least one World record and many National records resulted from this meet, including three National records from ACT swimmers.

4.3 ACT Interclubs

One Interclub was held in May by Tuggeranong, at the new Tuggeranong pool, followed by breakfast.

4.4 Interstate Meets

ACT swimmers participated in the National Swim in Adelaide, the NSW Sort Course and State Championships, other NSW meets, postal events and open water swims in NSW and SA.

5. OFFICIALS TRAINING

A Timekeepers Accreditation Course was held in June, with many ACT members completing the course. The accreditation of other technical officials is likely to occur during 1995.

6. SOCIAL EVENTS

Social events, ranging from dinners to weekends in the Mountains, continued to be organised by clubs, some on a monthly basis.

In closing I wish to thank everyone who has contributed to the running of the ACT Branch and on behalf of the ACT Branch wish all AUSSI members a healthy and successful 1995.
